Important: LingroHub is the central platform for this course. All course content, assignments, and your eBook Arriba are accessed through LingroHub. Blackboard will be used only for grade averages and general reference content.

Course Description

SPAN 1412 (4:3:3) is the continuation of Beginning Spanish I. It expands development of basic Spanish language skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing within a cultural framework. Students will acquire additional vocabulary and grammar, including narrating in past tenses. This course covers Chapters 5–9 of Arriba.

Prerequisite: SPAN 1411 or equivalent background.

Attendance Policy

- Attendance is mandatory for this face-to-face class.
- Students are allowed up to 4 absences. On the 4th absence, you will be automatically dropped from the course. This policy is firm.
- Arrive on time and stay for the entire class to be counted present.
- If you must miss class due to illness, emergency, or school activity, notify the instructor as soon as possible.
- Late work is not accepted; however, communication with the instructor may allow flexibility for pending (not overdue) assignments.

Assignments & Coursework

Assignments must be prepared before class and are due at the start of class (unless stated otherwise). Online assignments are due by 11:59 PM CST on assigned dates. These will generally be posted on Mondays, with 1–3 due dates scheduled during the week.

Types of Assignments

- LingroHub SAM activities: Multiple attempts allowed; highest grade counts.
- TXT activities: Textbook-based reading assignments.
- Extra Practice: End-of-chapter graded activities (not optional).
- Practice Tests: Assigned before exams; multiple attempts allowed.
- Grammar/Vocabulary Tutorials: Always available in LingroHub.
- Exams: Timed, one attempt, covering grammar, vocabulary, listening, reading, and writing.
- Other than exams, most assignments can be attempted up to 3 times, with your highest grade recorded. Auto-graded assignments provide immediate feedback. Recordings and short dialogues must be manually scored by the instructor. Until reviewed, LingroHub records a temporary grade of 0. Do not panic if you see a sudden drop in your gradebook after submitting these assignments—your score will be updated once grading is completed.

Note: Use of online translators for assignments is prohibited and considered academic dishonesty.

Time Commitment

Expect to spend 3–5 hours weekly outside of class for preparation, vocabulary review, and practice.

- Oral Final Evaluation: Mandatory comprehensive oral exam (format and date TBD).
